

GREAT STANMORE

Great Stanmore was an ancient parish in county of Middlesex, where it formed part Gore hundred. Civil parishes took over from ancient parishes in the 1860s and Great Stanmore became part of Hendon Rural District in 1894. In 1934 it was absorbed into Harrow Urban District and when the London Boroughs were created in 1964, Great Stanmore became part of the London Borough of Harrow.



Great Stanmore and Little Stanmore are two long thin parishes together forming a rectangle of land which is located some 10 miles to the north-west of central London. They were recorded in the *Domesday Book* as 'Stanmere' (Great Stanmore on the west) and 'Stanmera' (Little Stanmore on the east), each with its own manor, but until the late 19th century they were very much small rural communities. The 1801 population of 1146 had only risen to 2896 by 1901. The southern more populated part lies about 200 feet above sea level and the northern part (which includes the common) rises to over 470 feet above sea level. On a clear day much of London can be seen from the top of the hill. The names of the Stanmores seem rather the wrong way round as Great Stanmore is smaller in area than its neighbour Little Stanmore.

The Society has produced a Parish Guide to Great Stanmore which includes further information about the churches below as well as nonconformist and other denominations.

Until 1632 the parish church stood on the corner of Old Church Lane and Wolverton Road. Then, a new church was built at the top of Old Church Lane on the Uxbridge Road. This is now a ruin in the churchyard of the current church.
